Survivor

For a victim of crime who has taken her or his own personal experience and transformed it into action or advocacy on behalf of other victims of crime.

Outstanding Service Provider

This award is given to a direct service provider who has gone above and beyond the call of duty in order to assist crime victims. Members of Human Services (DSS, Public Health, etc), Victim Service Non-Profits (like Turning Point), Medical Professionals (including Mental Health), and First Responders, would fit under this category.

System Based Advocate

This award is given to a member of the criminal justice / legal system who exemplify true advocacy on behalf of victims of crime, including the improvement of the treatment of crime victims, working for systemic change, or aiding in the response of violence or prevention. Law enforcement, parole/probation, legal professionals, and public safety qualify for this category.

Distinguished Humanitarian

This award is given to an individual who has demonstrated exceptional dedication to victim services or have changed the culture and practice in Union County's response to victims of crime over their career or lifetime. Must have 15+ years of service in aiding survivors.

Community Based Advocate

This award is presented to an individual or group/program who has gone above and beyond in advocating, impacting, and promoting the use of victim services or helping professions, prevention, offender accountability, and community outreach & education. Included in this category are volunteers, faith based groups, and school personnel.
